But not everything about chocolate is so sweet....

- Cocoa farmers only get a fraction of the money we pay for a chocolate bar: the chocolate companies and shops make most of the profits from the cocoa trade.
- Farmers are often cheated by local cocoa buyers who under-weigh their products.
- Modern-day child labour and slavery is associated with the cocoa trade in West Africa.
- Buying Fairtrade products can help ensure a fairer deal for farmers.

Since the 2000s, Western Africa produces almost two-thirds of the world's cocoa.
